

## 8. Other Ingram Families in Clay County

Only three Ingram families were listed in the 1840 Census: John C., Edward, and Gabriel. As discussed previously, Edward was probably a transcription error for Edmund. There is no known relation among these families.

**John C. Ingram** moved to Coosa County before 1850. He is listed in the 1850 Census there as a farmer with his family: John C. (age 37), Mary Ann (33), Marcus (16) Humphry (13), William (11), Mary J. (9), Nancy (7), Flora (5), Charles (3), and Sarah (1).

According to Stultz (p. 118) his will was written on August 3, 1865. It refers to mills and land for mills in Rockford and refers to his youngest son, John G. and youngest daughter Susan V. and to grandchildren of H. G. (Humphry).

**Gabriel Ingram** was born in NC in 1810. As we have seen previously, he purchased land in Clay County, near the Talladega County line. He was living in Talladega County at the time of the 1850 Census and was buried in that county. Most of his children lived in Talladega or Coosa Counties. His son John P. also purchased land in Clay County that bordered property purchased by his father.

The 1850 Census for Talladega County shows: Gabriel C. (age 40), Margaret (33), James (15), Hezekiah (13), John (11), Martha J. (9), Imanuel (7), William (5), Mary (4), and Thomas (3).

A legal notice filed in Talladega County on July 26, 1855 by his second wife Louisa found him “advanced in year . . . and she had decided to leave his house . . . with the intention never to live with him another day . . .” Apparently, he later agreed to a divorce or separation in April 1857.

Gabriel's son, Thomas, and some of his family are buried in Bethlehem Cemetery in Clay County. Gabriel's son, **Hezekiah**, is documented in the book *Horse and Buggy Days on Hatchet Creek* by Mitchell Garrett. He owned a mill and was considered fairly well off by community standards. The mill was used to grind corn and wheat, to gin cotton, and to saw lumber. He also owned a workshop, where his son Anderson was a carpenter and made furniture, and a blacksmith shop (Garrett, p. 17-18). Hezekiah served in the Civil War in the 31st Ala Regiment. A census of living Clay County, AL residents that served in the war is located in the Library in Ashland, AL and here is what it says about Hezekiah:

Ingram, Hezekiah P.O. Chandler Springs, Al. Born May 7 1837 in Troup County, Ga.; first entered service as Pvt may 1862 at Talladega, Ala. in 31<sup>st</sup> Ala. Regt Co. G and continued until captured at Bakers Creek, Miss and was paroled at same place about May 1863. Re-enlisted as Pvt in Fall 1863 at Demopolis, Ala. in 31st Regt Co. G and continued until surrender and was released at Augusta, Ga. In Spring of 1865.

Hezekiah, Lavinia and several of their children are buried in Bethlehem Cemetery in Clay County in the southwest corner of the county.

The 1850 Census of Randolph County included three Ingram families other than Edmund's. **Samuel Ingram** was 30 and born in North Carolina. His wife Sarah was 29 and born in Georgia. Children were Fara (7), Solomon (5), David (4), and George (1). **John Ingram** was 41 and born in North Carolina. His wife Martha was 41 and born in Georgia. Children were Elizabeth (16), Robert (14), Chapman (12), Sarah (10), Alfred (8), Martin (6), Mary (4), and Jane P. (1). **Might Ingram** was 39 and born in North Carolina. His wife Lydia was 36 and born in South Carolina. Children were Alfred (14), Samuel (13), John (11), William (7), Franklin (4), and Mary (1).

The 1860 Census in Randolph County listed at least three different Ingram families, as indicated in Exhibit 8-1. There is no known relation between Edmund and the other families. The list includes the John Ingram family from the 1850 Census, but there is no record of either the Samuel or Might Ingram families living in Clay County in 1860.

**Bryant Ingram** purchased land in Clay County near Ashland. Bryant Ingram and Elizabeth are buried in Auslin Chapel Methodist Cemetery, Randolph County, east of Lineville. He was born about 1800 and died prior to 1880.

**John Ingram** moved to Coosa County, AL prior to 1870. He is shown as a widower and farmer. Most of his children lived in Coosa County. His daughter Victoria's name was Queen Victoria. There is no known relation between this John, Bryant, Gabriel, or John C. who resided in Randolph County in 1840. However, all indicated that they were born in North Carolina. The 1870 Census for Coosa County shows: John (age 60), Roda (30), Martha (28), Mary (20), Augusta A. (18), Victoria (16), and Adiron (15).

Stultz (p. 119) contains a list of children mentioned in the will of John Ingram on March 15, 1884: daughters—Elizabeth Dunnaway, Sarah Lambert, Mary Johnson, Jane Fulmer, Gusta Ann Holley, Queen V. Hardy, Martha Ingram, Rhoda P. Ingram and sons—Chapman and Alfred.

The 1880 Census of Clay County includes **Hezekiah** Ingram and his family, **Alford P.** Ingram and family, and **Thomas B.** Ingram and family. Also included is **W. H.** Ingram, age 32. He and his family were living in the Delta area. He was born in Alabama and his father in Georgia. Included in the family were his wife Mary (age 43), Thomas (8), Ema (5), and a stepdaughter Virginia (13). In the 1900 Census, he is listed as Wm. H. and living with his wife in Lamar County, Texas. In the 1910 Census, he is listed as a hired man living with the Weaver family in Calhoun County, Alabama. Emma Francis Idora Ingram married Matthew C. McClintock of Delta, Alabama. He was a cousin of Lewis McClintock who married Frances Jane Ingram, daughter of Andrew Jackson Ingram. In 1900, Matthew and Emma were living in Lamar County, Texas. She died in 1948 in Bakersfield, California.

The 1900 Census of Clay County includes children from several of the families discussed previously. Exhibit 8-2 shows the census district and page number. Birth dates and relation to head of household are included as well.

It is apparent that several Ingram families lived in or wandered through Clay County and the nearby area during the late 1800s. I have been unsuccessful in linking these various families to Edmund. Perhaps others will be more successful in identifying any relationships.
